## Preliminary Statement

The Committee for the Memorial to the late Augustus Stafford Esq. having had a new roof (designed by W. Slater & executed by Mr John Ryan) placed over the Chancel of the Cathedral it became apparent that the ceiling of the rest of the Nave was in a very bad state and the roof imperfect and unsightly.

At a meeting of the Chapter in September it was proposed out of the Chapter funds to repair the ceiling and to raise over the roof with a Meeting of Boards, the cost of which was estimated at £300, which it was proposed should be raised by Loan.

The following letter was written to the Limerick Chronicle.

### THE CATHEDRAL.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.

SIR—As the state of the roof and ceiling of the Cathedral at Limerick is now under the consideration of the Dean and Chapter, I trust you will use the influence of your journal to raise a protest against any temporary work being erected; and that whatever is undertaken be with the best advice, and of a character to endure. The main structure of the church was erected about the end of the 12th century; and the contributors to the memorial of the late Mr. Stafford, having executed a restoration of the chancel from types of early Irish Gothic architecture, it is earnestly to be hoped that whatever is done in future (however protracted the work may be) the same principle will be adhered to with respect to this cathedral, now one of the very few churches of that period not in ruins. It has been suggested that if two hundred persons would give ten pounds each, in two instalments, and call upon the Dean and Chapter to contribute £500, the restoration of a great part of the building might be effected. If the laity of the diocese and county would only recollect the fact that the cathedral is for the use of them and their children, such a sum would at once be made up; and I am convinced that many persons elsewhere, on national grounds, would contribute to preserve a building of such antiquity.

# St. Mary's Cathedral Church in Limerick.

---

"This Cathedral was built and endowed by Donald O'Brian, King of Limerick, about the time of the coming of the English into Ireland."—*Sir James Ware, Antiquities of Ireland.*

"DONAGH O'BRIAN, descended of the Royal Family of the O'Brians, succeeded Bishop Brictius, a Dane. He was the first who enlarged the Cathedral and supplied it with secular canons, to whom he assigned certain Prebendaries, and ordained Law for their Government. He died in 1207, no less noble for his learning, prudence and liberality, than by his birth."

"HUBERT DE BURGO succeeded Geoffry, 1223. He was a great benefactor to the Cathedral and Vicars Choral."

"EUSTACHIUS DEL EWE or WATERS, was consecrated 1311. He was at great charge in the repairing and beautifying his Church."—*Sir James Ware, Commentary of the Prelates of Ireland.*

"The warlike Donald O'Brien, retained Possession of his ancient patrimony to the day of his death. This Prince was not only a brave defender of the rights of his country, but, a munificent benefactor of the Church; for, besides founding many other religious houses, he appropriated his palace to a similar use, on the site of which, the Venerable Cathedral of St. Mary's, was erected soon after."—*Fitzgerald and McGregor's History of Limerick.*

There is no doubt that the nave, transepts and base of the tower, were either the original building or the addition made by Bishop Donough O'Brien, and therefore belong to the period known by Antiquarians as the "Early Gothic," while the south transept was probably added by Eustachius del Ewe, a century later.

With this view the Committee for the memorial to the late Mr. Stafford have restored the Chancel in accordance with the remains of Irish Buildings of the former period.

From the great size of the Church, and the inadequacy of available funds, coupled with the little consideration that the subject of Gothic Architecture had received, while parts of the building have barely been kept from decay, other parts have been repaired from time to time, without any reference to the architecture of the past, and in a manner unworthy of the dignity and antiquity of the structure.

The alternative proposed at the present moment is, either to erect a new roof, or at a considerable cost to cover the defect of the present roof with a sheeting of boards, entirely at variance with the new roof over the chancel, which, from the peculiar circumstance of there being no chancel arch in this Cathedral, ought to be continued from end to end.

An appeal is therefore made to the good feelings of the Inhabitants of the Diocese and County, and of all who may have a desire to maintain one of the last of the ancient Irish Churches not in ruins, and they are entreated to come forward, and raise a sum as may serve to perpetuate the Cathedral for the service of God, and give to the structure some share of the decoration so lavishly applied to houses, and places of amusement.

It is proposed, that, if the Dean and Chapter, out of their corporate funds, will provide £500, Subscribers should undertake to contribute Ten Pounds each, in two instalments, the first payable on or before the 1st November, 1859, and the other on or before the 1st February, 1860.

# Restoration of Limerick Cathedral.

---

The Cathedral Church of Saint Mary, Limerick, is for many reasons, one of the most interesting Ecclesiastical Structures of the Empire, and worthy of notice, not more on account of its great Antiquity, than from its many Historical Associations, and the peculiar style of its Architecture.

Founded and Endowed in the year 1172, its extreme age, alone, would entitle it to our respect, were it merely a common Building used only for secular purposes, but its sacred Character invests it with a deep and holy interest, and, as a Church of Christ which for 700 years has been Consecrated to His Solemn Worship, and within whose Venerable Walls the daily Service of the Church is still regularly performed, it must ever be regarded with reverend affection, and claims our most active sympathies.

Viewed as one of the very few remaining Specimens of Early Gothic Architecture, Saint Mary's Limerick is full of interest, and may fairly challenge comparison with any Ecclesiastical Building of its time. The general effect of the whole (now that the Interior is opened up to view,) is most striking, and many causes combine, to invest it with a solemn grandeur and the noble simplicity of the Original Design.—The perfect harmony and proportion observed in the arrangement.—The immense strength and solidity of Construction.—The Tower of great height and beauty, which surmounts the western Entrance.—The numerous Arches resting on massive Piers, which adorn the Interior—impart an air of simple and sober majesty to this Ancient Church, and few can visit it without being impressed with devout and solemn feelings.

During the memorable Siege of Limerick, the Cathedral suffered much from the Batteries of King William's Army, the Soldiers of Cromwell having previously pillaged and desecrated the Interior, destroying and mutilating many of the Monuments with which it then abounded.

Notwithstanding the lapse of ages however, and many vicissitudes, the Exterior of the Building is still in substantial repair, and most venerable in appearance, but the Interior has been from time to time sadly injured and disfigured by Alterations executed in the worst taste, and utterly out of Character with the main features of the Original Edifice.

An opportunity for reviving (in part, at least,) the simple beauty of the Old Cathedral, arose lately, in consequence of the erection of a Stained Window in memory of the late Mr. Augustus Stafford, M.P., which led to the Restoration of the Choir and Main Roof. Great exertions have been made, and are still making, to complete in a worthy manner, the work thus undertaken, but a large sum is needed for the purpose, as a considerable outlay is necessary, before the Church can be re-opened for Divine Service. A further appeal is therefore unavoidable, and the assistance of all those who take an interest in the good of the Church Restoration, is earnestly solicited.

It cannot be denied that a Sacred Building, which has been transmitted to our times through so many Centuries, should not now be allowed to suffer from our neglect. Limerick Cathedral, therefore, has a very strong claim upon all who have any regard for the honour of God's House, and surely those whom He has blessed with means and with a desire to glorify His Name, will now contribute towards the preservation of one of the most Ancient Churches in the United Kingdom. "Is it time for you, to dwell in your Ceiled Houses and this House lie waste."—*Haggai* 1. 4.

**K CATHEDRAL AND KILKEE ORGAN.**

**EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK BIONICLE.**  
 being in the habit of taking in local papers at any station I may be quartered at, it happened that I perused your publication of last week, having on my return from Kilkee sent for it to see any account there of the Cork Harbour Rowing Club Regatta which took place on the previous day. Whilst looking over the paper my attention was arrested by two letters relative to the Limerick Cathedral, signed "Venerator" and "Instant Reader," also by a paragraph in the same issue referring to a proposed organ at Kilkee Church. The two letters serve to inform me of what may be done by means of a subscription, and induce me to hope that something will be accomplished towards improving the interior of the Cathedral. On my arrival in Limerick last May twelvemonths I recollect going to try and secure two sittings, but I found that for Divine Service the reason being a course of erection to the memory of the late Augustus Stafford, M.P. The following week again on my way to the Cathedral to see the lady over it when Lord Inchiquin and Mr. Webb went over every part of the building, including the tower, and at his Lordship's request made a careful examination of the roof. As we were about that the sudden drop of six or seven feet in the new roof over the window and the most unsightly I asked him to whom I should speak on the subject, and Lord Inchiquin directed me to his brother, Mr. Robert O'Brien. Being the latter at the Club I mentioned the state of the roof, and how advisable it would be to have the new one, to open out the choir to the west, remove the present pews and galleries, and the site of the organ, in all of which I believe Mr. Robert O'Brien fully coincided. Then came the question—where was the money to be got from? I suggested the Dean and Chapter, and then attempted to raise £2,000 by 200 subscribers might succeed. Of course the idea was laughed at by all, except Mr. Robert O'Brien. You may, therefore, guess my surprise when I read in the Kilkee, read a letter, I think, in your issue in him stating that such an idea had been suggested and some little time after he shewed me a list of about sixteen £10 subscriptions, to which he had added—and which by-the-by I have never seen. Eventually, I believe, a tolerable sum was raised, not, as hoped for, £2,000, and I was glad to find that the Dean and Chapter had given £500, and I was contributing £50 of the latter. The consequence was that the old roof was taken off and a new one throughout, several more feet higher, substituted. Now I so entirely agree with the views expressed by "Venerator" and "Instant Reader," that, although I can ill afford to do so, I will willingly make one of another hundred subscribers to raise £500 more to carry out the much needed and still incomplete improvements. Indeed, I am rejoiced to find that some persons are really interested in the matter, as I can truly say that out of all the persons who appeared to take any active interest in the old edifice. Of course, in speaking thus, I include the clergy, being ignorant of their sentiments. I naturally must be, when none out of their ranks, with the exception of my own present rector, have come near me since my arrival—a complaint which the parochial ministers very generally made, I believe, in this city.

As the paragraph about the organ at Kilkee, which I saw in your issue, is so inaccurate, beyond the fact that it was at Kilkee church last Sunday, and noticed by Major MacDonnell, also to several persons at the Hotel, that not only was the singing even worse than at this time last year, there being positions of thorough break-downs, but that I could not help but deploring to see so many well-dressed

ladies and gentlemen—I might say even for a country watering place, over-dressed ladies—in church, not only not bearing any vocal part in the service, but allowing this little church to want the necessary funds to purchase an organ; also that at a charity sermon there should be more copper coins than silver ones contributed where there was scarcely a poor looking person present. There, as here, I am unacquainted with the clergy, but I shall be only too delighted in this case likewise to make one of ten persons to raise £50 for the organ as above. I certainly must plead to having expressed a few strong opinions on the subject. If your paragraph, therefore, is the cause of an organ being purchased, I shall feel truly thankful, instead of annoyed, at its insertion, in which sentiment of gratitude I am sure all good churchmen and visitors will unite with me.

letter, in a recent number of your journal, referring to the improvements now in progress at the Limerick Cathedral, brought out communications from me and "Anti-Bunkum," in both of which it was regretted much irrelevant matter was introduced, it being very important that the paper should not be diverted from the object—the completion of these improvements.

Hitherto applied to the improvements made up of a sum appropriated to the Dean and Chapter, together with a contribution chiefly of £10 each, raised through the efforts of a couple members of the improvement-committee, which have worked in unison with the Dean, and Chapter. These subscriptions have been paid in with great punctuality with the exception of two or three cases, of which Capt. Gabbett is one; and it only needs an inspection of what has been done to shew the judicious and judicious manner in which these funds have been applied.

The chief parts of the improvements are now in a forward way, so that a comparatively small sum for completion is now only required. It is suggested a £5 subscription, and the Dean and Chapter (to which Gabbett has responded to his call for a subscription), which it is to be hoped will be raised amongst both clergy and laity in the diocese. The Clergymen of the diocese could not fail to raise contributions of £5 each, or in smaller subscriptions, by contributing in this way, the necessary funds would be raised. No Cathedral in Ireland has been so neglected; but with united efforts following up what has already been so judiciously effected, this stigma will henceforward be inapplicable. No object, then, can be claimed upon the Protestant Committee of the diocese, than to see that the improvements are carried out in a complete manner, and that the veneration due to this Cathedral, the parent Church of the diocese, but also its antiquity, and its historical associations with the Counties of Limerick and Clare, and the City in which it stands.

## LIMERICK CATHEDRAL.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.

SIR—The remarks of your correspondent in your last number will meet with general consent, as it needs but a glance at the improvements now making in this venerable cathedral to show the importance of finding a new position for the organ. To re-instate it in its former position would be sure to meet with general reprobation; and it is gratifying to know that the Dean and Chapter, as well as the improvement committee, are fully sensible of the importance and necessity of the change. In all restorations and improvements now-a-days a suitable position in one of the aisles is chosen for the organ, so as to throw open the whole nave and chancel into one vista; and as the organ is now down it is impossible to conceive that in Limerick we would be guilty of the barbarism of re-erecting it in so objectionable a position.

So far as the improvements have already progressed—and they are now in a very advanced stage—they reflect great credit on the improvement committee and the Dean and Chapter, who have united in carrying out the restorations; what has been done manifests both taste and judgment, and a close inspection shows the care and finish that has been bestowed on the execution—we need only refer to the reredos, recently erected, as a specimen of the rest, which is all of the finest dressed French stone, with Italian and Galway marble panels.

The chancel and window, which are the most costly parts, are now finished; the new roof, covering the whole of the nave and chancel, is also finished; all the clerestory windows are opened out and newly glazed, which has greatly improved the internal light, and it is stated that the new stalls of carved oak and the central pews are provided, and will be erected immediately. Having accomplished so much, it is to be hoped the committee will not close their labours until a suitable screen is provided, and suitable arrangements made for effectually warming the cathedral. These would render complete all that has been done, and that need at present be attempted. It is to be hoped, therefore, that nothing will stand in the way of getting these most essential parts finished at once; and if the funds are deficient, it can only be necessary to say so in a diocese with so many wealthy residents, and possessing the oldest cathedral in preservation in Ireland, and wanting only a small sum to complete what has already been so well accomplished, and at a very moderate cost.

A New Roof has been extended from the Chancel to the Tower ;

The Clerestory Windows have been opened and glazed ;

The Reredos given for the Stafford Memorial has been brought over from London, and erected ;

New Carved Oak Canopies are in hands, for part of the Stalls ;

The Floors in the Choir and Chancel have been replaced ; beside smaller works incidental to the above.

These must be added :

The New East Window filled with Stained Glass by Messrs. Clayton & Bell, with a New Roof over the Chancel, and a Stone and Marble Reredos, effected by Subscription, as a Memorial to the late Augustus O'Brien Stafford, Esq., M.P.

The Lord Bishop has promised Fifty Pounds for the re-erection of the Organ.

The Dean and Chapter have re-seated part of the Church.

The Earl of Limerick, chiefly at his own cost, has had one bell re-cast, and the other seven mounted, and, also the floors of the Belfry renewed.

Captain Brine, R.E., has undertaken to endeavour to collect a sufficient sum to Case the Two Transept Roofs to correspond with the Nave.

Another person has undertaken to provide the Altar Rail, Steps, and Tiles for the Chancel Floor.

The Reverends M. De Burgh and F. C. Hamilton have given a Carved Oak Altar Table, and Chairs for the Chancel.

A considerable Sum is still required for :—

The Extension of the Stalls and Canopies ;

The Completion of the Sittings ;

The Removal of the Organ ;

Securing the Church from exterior cold ;

Providing efficient Stoves, &c., for warming the interior ;

New Skreens in the Choir ;

Besides other Works, which must not be neglected.

Roman Catholics in this Diocese have raised several thousand pounds, for the erection of a new Cathedral, and it seems not reasonable to expect that a sufficient sum will be contributed for restoring our ancient one.

St. Mary's Cathedral was founded and endowed about 1172, and is now one of the very few ancient buildings in Ireland, which has not been allowed to go to ruin. Notwithstanding the destruction of the interior by the Cromwellian soldiers, and of the exterior by the Williamite army, the church has been kept up for the service of God to the present day.

There is no doubt that the nave, transepts and base of the tower, were either the original building or the addition made by Bishop Donough O'Brien, and therefore belong to the period known by Antiquarians as the "Early Gothic," while the south transept were probably added by Eustachius del Ewe, a century later.

With this view the Committee for the memorial of the late Mr. Augustus Stafford, M.P., have restored the Chancel in accordance with the remains of Irish Buildings of the former period.

From the great size of the Church, and the inadequacy of available funds, coupled with the little consideration that the style of Gothic Architecture had received, while parts of the building have barely been kept from decay, other parts have been neglected from time to time, without any reference to the architecture of the past, and in a manner unworthy of the dignity and appearance of the structure.

This Cathedral being an object of interest to every stranger who visits Limerick, and the last resting place of many illustrious men connected with our City and County, it is hoped that a great effort will now be made to procure funds, and that those who have already contributed, will use their influence with others to do the same, that the Restoration of the Building may be completed in a manner worthy of the object.

As the Church must be re-opened for Divine Service on the 1st of December next, it is necessary to know immediately what funds are available for the works.

The Earl of Limerick, chiefly at his own cost, has had one bell re-cast, and the other seven mounted, and, also the floors Belfry renewed.

Captain Brine, R.E., has undertaken to endeavour to collect a sufficient sum to Case the Two Transept Roofs to correspond with the Nave.

Another person has undertaken to provide the Altar Rail, Steps, and Tiles for the Chancel Floor.

The Reverends M. De Burgh and F. C. Hamilton have given a Carved Oak Altar Table, and chairs for the Chancel.

The Extension of the Stalls and Canopies ;

The Completion of the Sittings ;

The Removal of the Organ ;

Securing the Church from exterior cold ;

Providing efficient Stoves, &c., for warming the interior ;

New Skreens in the Choir ;

Besides other Works, which must not be neglected.

Roman Catholics in this Diocese have raised several thousand pounds, for the erection of a new Cathedral, and it seems reasonable to expect that a sufficient sum will be contributed for restoring our ancient one.

St. Mary's Cathedral was founded and endowed about 1172, and is now one of the very few ancient buildings in Ireland, as not been allowed to go to ruin. Notwithstanding the destruction of the interior by the Cromwellian soldiers, and of the exterior by the Williamite army, the church has been kept up for the service of God to the present day.

This Cathedral being an object of interest to every stranger who visits Limerick, and the last resting place of many brave men connected with our City and County, it is hoped that a great effort will now be made to procure funds, and that those who have already contributed will use their influence with others to do the same, that the Restoration of the Building may be completed in a manner worthy of the object.

As the Church must be re-opened for Divine Service on the 1st of December, it is necessary to know immediately what resources are available for the works.

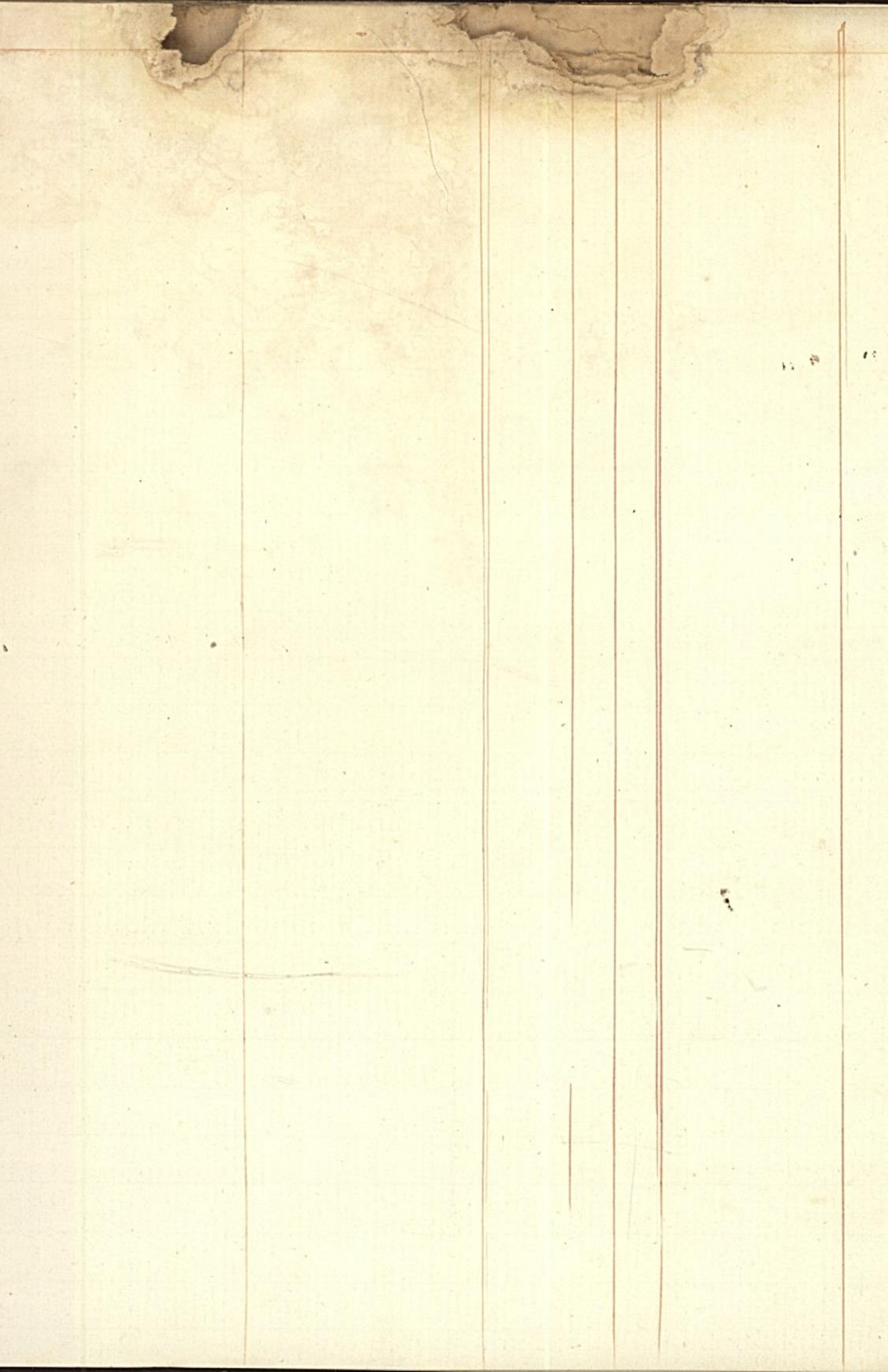

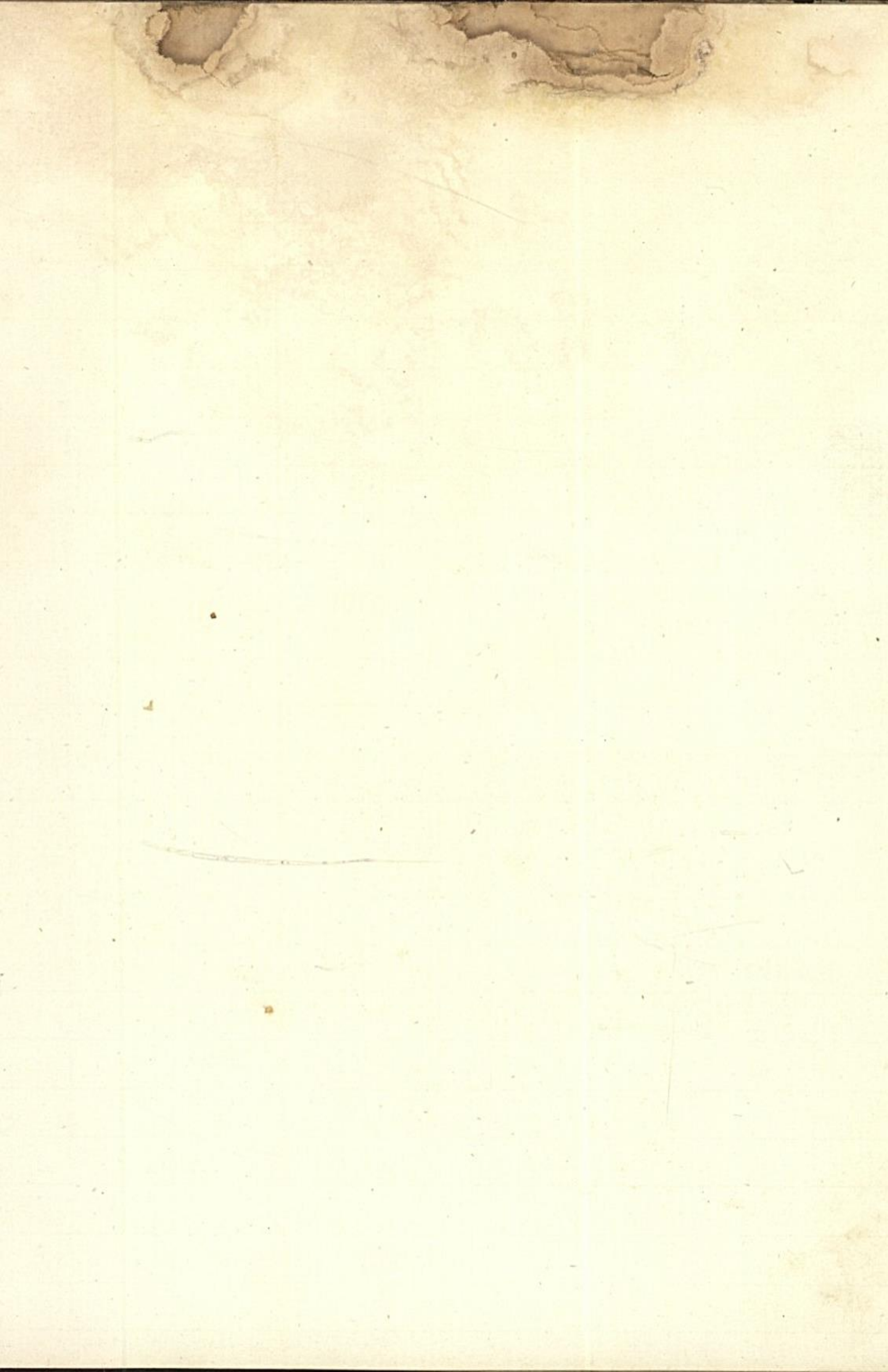

## Cathedral Church of St. Mary, Limerick.

---

The Cathedral having been re-opened for Service on Whit-Sunday, the following accounts are submitted to the Contributors who have assisted to carry on the works, which have been effected since it was closed,

The untimely death in 1857, of Mr. Augustus O'Brien Stafford having excited great sympathy, a desire was expressed by some of his relatives and friends, that a Memorial should be erected in Limerick Cathedral, to testify their esteem and affection for his memory; and those who wished to acknowledge the devotion of the latter years of his life to the care of the sick and wounded who had suffered in the Russian war, were invited to join.

A Committee was formed to carry out the object, and after various plans had been considered, it was finally decided to erect a Stained Glass Window in Limerick Cathedral, and Mr. William Slater, of London, architect, was employed by the Committee to examine the Church.

At the request of the Dean, the east window was selected for the purpose, and Mr. Slater reported that it would be necessary to remove the modern Perpendicular Window which was out of character with the rest of the building, and that a portion of the roof which was much decayed, should be renewed.

The Committee having adopted Mr. Slater's report, entered into contracts with Messrs. Ryan & Son for a New Roof over the Chancel and new stone work in the window; and with Messrs. Clayton & Bell for the stained glass.

The erection of these works commenced at Easter, 1859, when the Cathedral was closed, and were completed in the month of September following.

It was then found that the Ceiling over the rest of the Nave was in such a dangerous state that it was necessary to remove it immediately.

On the removal of the Ceiling, the decayed and rough condition of the Roof became so apparent that a proposition was laid before the Chapter to execute some repairs, and to cover the spaces between the rafters with plaster.

As it appeared that the resources of the Dean and Chapter were not sufficient to incur the expense of a new roof, an appeal was made to the public by the Earl of Limerick, Rev. F. C. Hamilton, and Robert O'Brien, Esq., aided by John Long, Esq., Honorary Secretary, to raise a portion of the money necessary for the purpose.

In a short time £460 was contributed in £10 subscriptions, and in October, 1859, Mr. Long addressed a letter to the Dean and Chapter, stating that that amount was available for extending the New Roof as far as the Tower, in accordance with what had been erected over the Chancel.

On the 18th January, 1860, a communication was received from the Dean and Chapter, stating that they had voted the sum of £305 10s. 7d. for a New Roof, and the Lord Bishop having added the sum of £50, a contract was entered into by the Dean with Messrs. Ryan & Son, and the Trustees handed over the £460.

As it was necessary to have designs and specifications for the Extension of the Roof, the Trustees requested Mr. Slater to supply them, and at the same time to prepare designs for fitting up the interior of the Cathedral, and to report generally upon the state of the Building, so that they might have a complete design for the whole to guide future operations.

At the time that the Committee for the Stafford Memorial was dissolved, the Reredos under the East Window was not completed, as they had only a sum of £25 for the purpose, which was not sufficient; but further subscriptions having been obtained, the Trustees agreed to complete the same on being handed over £70 10s., the cost of the work in London.



The Trustees also entered into contracts with Messrs. Cox & Son for new seats for the Choristers, and Canopies over the Stalls as far as the Organ Gallery, to be executed in carved oak.

The Dean having contracted for new seats in the Choir, on removal of the old ones the floors of the Chancel and Choir were found to be in a very bad state, and unless altered, Mr. Slater's designs could not be carried out. The Trustees agreed with Mr. Ryan to replace these floors.

The Trustees directed Mr. Ryan to open the Clerestory Windows which had been blocked up in the Choir, but open to the Nave; and being without sashes, through them a constant stream of cold air passed into the outer part of the Church. The opening of these windows has done much to restore the cathedral character to the building.

Lord Limerick, in August, 1860, presented an address to the Bishop, signed by "persons in the habit of attending the services at the Cathedral," requesting that the Organ Gallery should be removed, and his Lordship consented.

The Dean undertook the removal of the Galleries, and opened up the arches which had been blocked with brickwork and sashes.

The Dean opened the present Organ Gallery where the Organ has been re-erected, the Lord Bishop having contributed £50 towards the work.

The Dean also provided new stoves, new seats in the transepts, and soldiers' seats; removed all the monumental tablets into the North Chapel, and cleaned the walls of the whole building.

He also erected an entrance door in the South Porch, and other works which were executed under the constant supervision of the Rev. F. Hamilton.

Capt. Brine, R.E., proposed to line the Transept Roofs with timber to correspond with the nave, without removing the outer Roofs. For various reasons these works were not proceeded with, and almost all the subscriptions promised to him were handed over in aid of other works by the persons who had promised them.

After the removal of the Galleries Lord Limerick and Mr. Hamilton handed over the subscriptions received by them, to assist the works carried on by the Dean, and consequently they are not included in these accounts.

Mr Slater's attendance was again necessary to review the altered state of the Choir, and subscriptions were obtained and applied to,

- Extending the floor of the Choir,
- Providing twelve new oak stall seats,
- Deans' and Precentors' seats in carved oak,
- Continuation of the carved oak canopies over the stalls,
- Oak backing for the stalls.

The floors of the aisles were laid with limestone flags, which were almost always damp; on the removal of them, the earth in consequence of numerous graves was in a very bad state. It has now been covered with brick-work and Minton tiles set in cement.

Three rows of red marble steps from the Co. Clare have been laid at the entrance to the Choir.

As additional light was required in consequence of the increased height of the roof, gas pipes have been laid, extending through the Church as far as the chancel.

The Vestry was heated by a stove with a pipe passed through the window; a fireplace and flue with an arrangement for conveying warm air into the Chancel has been erected.

It was found that the water from the street passed in under the foundations of the east gable, and that in consequence the soil under the Chancel floor was quite damp. The foundations have been flagged over and secured.

A singular Credence arch with a circular window in the Chancel, which had been blocked up, and a stove placed in it, has been opened up, the window glazed, and Mr. J. Peacocke has since replaced the marble slab which had been broken away.

The Earl of Limerick finding that one of the peal of eight bells was broken, and the gear of all the others in such a decayed state that they could not be rung, had the broken bell re-cast, and the whole properly re-mounted, and has fitted up a neat room for the bell-ringers, with substantial floors. He
