ECI Climate Justice Candle at the World Meeting of Families 2018!

Jane Mellett, 'Our Common Home' Project Co-ordinator at the World Meeting of Families provided ECI with a report and wonderful photos of the Climate Justice Candle at the event. She mentioned that one of the most interactive and prayerful spaces at the event was the eco-prayer space which was located in the main Prayer Marque and this space had the ECI Climate Justice Candle at its centre.



Surrounding the candle were signs which brought pilgrims

on a journey using quotes from Laudato Si and images associated with Climate Justice. Pilgrims were able to write a prayer for the earth on eco-ribbons or prayer flags. These were hung on the surrounding walls. People sat on cushions having time to reflect, walked around the photo exposition, wrote their prayers for the earth and were also able to sign the Laudato Si pledge if they wished.

The ribbons and prayer flags accompanied the climate justice candle to the final liturgy in the RDS on Friday 24th August where the candle was clearly visible on the main sanctuary during the Mass and led the final procession with eco-volunteers and Trócaire volunteers. The Candle, prayer flags and ribbons were then brought to Christchurch Cathedral for that evening's interfaith event on Our Common Home which was attended by 400 people and included speakers from across faith communities in Dublin. ECI Climate Justice Candle visits Ballineaspaig Parish, Co Cork

Clare McCutcheon from the Faith in Action Group in Ballineaspaig Parish, Co Cork sent ECI a report on the visit of the ECI Climate Justice Candle to their parish where it was the focal point of their Harvest Thanksgiving and Sharing Celebration.

Fr Tom led the congregation in a celebration of the gifts of creation, through specially selected prayers and music. The Liturgy Group decorated the church with baskets of fruit and vegetables and a beautiful shrine symbolising the



abundance of the earth's bounty which we are so fortunate to enjoy. The focal point of the shrine was the ECI Climate Justice Candle, which reminded parishioners of the urgent issue of climate change and the stark contrast between the abundance we enjoy and the horrifying extremes of weather in other countries which impact so heavily on the poorest people of the world. Up to 80 people attended on the night when speakers included Beckey Finn Britton from An Taisce Clean Coasts, Eithne Larkin from Leave no Trace, Fergal O'Dowd from GMIT and Louise Hastings from Keep our Beaches Clean Louisburgh. Louise outlined the power of social media in gathering local volunteers to



clean up the beaches in Louisburgh after she witnessed appalling litter on Old Beach during the heat wave in late June. This one-off litter pick event became a regular event over the summer months. Her talk inspired all present to take further action to keep our beaches clean.

Following on from this Westport Eco-Congregation along with local volunteers carried out a clean-up in the Rosbeg area on Saturday 22nd. It was great to report that there was a minimal amount of rubbish to collect. Westport Eco-Congregation thanks all the volunteers and to Mayo Co Council for sponsoring their events. 

The parishioners used the brochure for the 'Curious Creatures: Frans Post and Brazil' exhibition in the National Gallery of Ireland as inspiration for their Creation Time thoughts and prayers. This exhibition portrayed images of creatures drawn by Frans Post in seventeenth century Brazil. These creatures are now described as seriously threatened like the South American Tapir, Jaguar, Giant Anteater and the critically endangered Spider Monkey. Update from Jubilee Farm, Co Antrim


Jubilee Farm in Northern Ireland is trying to raise £300,000 to purchase a small farm outside Larne, where they can bring their ambitious plans for Jubilee Farm to fruition, with organic pigs, poultry, goats and vegetables, plus an internship programme, and even "glamping" in due course. As a Community Benefit Society — a form of cooperative social enterprise — they are raising this money via a community share offer, making this the first community-owned farm in Northern Ireland. 

New Video from Operation Noah Highlighting Impact of Climate Change

<u>Operation Noah</u>'s new video, Sālote, aims to help Christians around the world recognise the human cost of climate change, and particularly its impact on women and children.



The short animated video, designed for Christians of all ages and developed in partnership with the <u>World Day of Prayer</u>, a women-led, global, ecumenical movement, introduces the viewer to Sālote, a seven-

year-old Polynesian girl who is already experiencing the devastating effects of a changing climate on her

South Pacific island home. As Sālote witnesses the impacts of climate change on three generations of her family, she reflects aloud on what has caused this change. Sālote is a free resource and is now <u>available to watch here</u>. Climate Change & Consciousness: Our Legacy for the Earth, April 20-26 2019, Findhorn Foundation

Climate Change & Consciousness: Our Legacy for the Earth, April 20-26 2019, will be a collaborative and participatory investigation into how we can steward a



sustainable future on what has already become a radically changed planet Earth. The conference will bring together eminent scientists, wisdom-keepers, business people, activists, artists, entrepreneurs, young people and others, to envision and begin to inhabit our joint future. It will be an international, intergenerational and multi-disciplinary gathering. This is the principle of 'the big tent', borrowed from party politics, whereby diverse viewpoints, backgrounds and interests (the 'voices in the room') are brought together to engage and dialogue.

Hosted at Findhorn Eco Community in Scotland, this conference will feature such internationally renowned speakers as Vandana Shiva, PhD, Nobel Laureate and world-renowned environmental thinker, activist, physicist, feminist, philosopher of science, science policy advocate and author of 20 books; Bill McKibben, one of the world's leading environmental journalists and Jonathon Porritt, founder and Director of Forum for the Future, the UK's leading sustainable development charity. <u>Visit their website for more information here</u>. Centre for Interreligious Dialogue DCU Organises Symposium on Religion & Climate Change

On 19 September 2018 a Symposium on Religion and Climate Change was organised by the Centre for Interreligious Dialogue and the School of Theology, Philosophy, and Music at DCU on the DCU All Hallows Campus entitled: 'The Sixth Extinction: Interreligious Insights, Warnings and Questions: A Symposium on Religion and Climate Change. academics from a range of disciplines (Theology, Communications, Law, Ethics, and Philosophy), field workers, scientists, NGO workers, interfaith experts, and doctoral students. Catherine O'Toole, Development Officer for <u>Irish Environmental Network</u> is spreading the news of a new community initiative called the Public Participation Network, or PPN for short and is searching for environmentally focused groups in Ireland to join. She explains: 'There is a PPN in every county. It is completely free to join and there are many benefits for PPN members. The main aim of the PPN is to provide community members the opportunity to have their voice heard in the local County Council. There is huge potential to create positive change by giving your input into motions and policies that are being created, and by putting forward your own motions and policies that are in your community's interest. If your group were to sign up, you would also receive important information about what is happening in your county, such as events, funding

Eco Challenge!

Rev Trevor Sargent's Ecological Notes for September 2018 - Drive Slower to Cut Greenhouse Gas Emissions!

Rev Trevor Sargent is one of the Church of Ireland representatives on the ECI committee. Trevor shared his Ecological Notes with us for the month of September. You can read them in full on the ECI website here. One theme in the notes this month is cutting speed when driving and how this helps us reduce our carbon emissions. He shares the story of what one person is doing to play her part, how speed really does matter in helping to reduce emissions and discusses speed and inner peace!



Trevor writes: 'The Bible may have a message for our approach to driving in Ecclesiastes 4:6, 'Better is a handful with quiet than two handfuls with toil, and a chasing after wind.' Likewise, St Francis de Sales, (1567 – 1622), who was the Roman Catholic Bishop of Geneva, said, 'Never be in a hurry; do everything quietly and in a calm spirit. Do not lose your inner peace for anything whatsoever, even if your whole world seems upset.' It has been said that Christians worship a '3 km/hr God'. Jesus exercised a walking ministry. His way of life alone might suggest that leaving more time for each journey is a good idea all round'. Great advice! Let's slow down!

We have come to discover some new beauty every day in God's creation: the sunrise and sunset, birds, flowers and trees, rainbows in the sky, the stars, many forms of life in water and the ocean, in fields and forest.

We have come to listen to the "music of the universe" - birdsong, water flowing over rocks, the wind, leaves fluttering in the wind, raindrops pattering on the roof.

We will remember always that God speaks to us through the beauty of creation and we commit to try our best to answer God's call to reverence all creation.
